Dru Buntin

2nd Vice-Chairman, ICWP Board of Directors, and Legislation & Policy Committee Chairman and Executive Director, Upper Mississippi River Basin Association

Dru was appointed to this position in June 2013. UMRBA is the regional interstate organization formed by the five basin Governors to coordinate the states' river-related programs and policies and work with federal agencies that have river management responsibilities.

As Executive Director, Dru is involved in policy, planning, and legislative issues related to habitat restoration and protection, water quality, commercial navigation and channel maintenance, floodplain management and flood control, water supply and interbasin diversions, and hazardous spill response. In addition to working closely with UMRBA's member states, this involves extensive coordination with the states' federal agency counterparts as well as nongovernmental partners.

Over a period of 12 years at the Missouri DNR, Dru served as the Deputy Director for Policy, Chief of Water Resources, and as the Director of Governmental Affairs. In those roles, Dru worked on important river-related issues including flood recovery, endangered species, drought relief, energy efficiency, water quantity, and hydropower. He also served on multiple intergovernmental bodies during this time, including UMRBA's Board of Directors. Additionally, Dru worked in Missouri's Washington, D.C. Office and the Office of the Governor for several years before joining Missouri DNR.

Pam advises DRBC staff and commissioners on legal and procedural questions, manage rulemakings and ensure decision-making records clearly support agency actions. In collaboration with technical staff, she analyzes and develops policy alternatives and proposals, and crafts rules and resolutions. She communicates scientific, fiscal and technical issues to professionals and lay people, including policy makers, and she manages grants and contracts. The OWRB accomplishes its mission of managing and protecting Oklahoma's water resources, through a nine member board, executive director, and staff of scientists, engineers, financial analysts, attorneys, and administrative team. In 2013, the OWRB was named Top Workplace by The Oklahoman!

As chief, Julie oversees all aspects of water management, including the administration of over 13,000 water rights, the Comprehensive Water Plan, a 50-year technical and policy strategy, basin-wide hydrologic studies, well drillers licensure, floodplain and drought management and safety of over 4,700 dams.

Julie has also served as the Water Quality Standards section head, State Revolving Fund manager, and assistant chief of OWRB's \$3B Financial Assistance Program, which finances over two thirds of Oklahoma's water infrastructure construction through loans and grant to public entities. She holds or has held leadership roles and affiliations on four interstate river compact commissions, Association of Western State Engineers, and U.S.G.S Climate Science Center Advisory Committee, State-U.S. EPA State Revolving Fund Working Group and Performance Measures Task Group, North American Lakes Management Society, and American Planning Association.

Drew's appointment as Executive Director in September 2013 follows two three-year management assignments at the SRBC with first the Planning and Operations program and most recently the Project Review program. The latter work in the Commission's regulatory program entailed directing the review of applications and formulation of recommendations and policies related to proposed surface and ground water withdrawals, interbasin transfers, and the consumptive use of water by industries, public water suppliers, power generation facilities and the natural gas industry. Prior to holding management positions, Drew provided 12 years of Commission service as a water resources engineer involved in many aspects of water resources management, including water availability and safe yield analyses, reservoir operations, and drought and flood management.

Drew earned his B.S. and M.E. in Civil Engineering from the University of Virginia, and has been a licensed professional engineer in Pennsylvania since 2001.

Ted manages this section, which oversees the Platte River, Upper Colorado River, and San Juan River Recovery Implementation ESA Programs, the Decision Support Systems, and a variety of other water programs for the State of Colorado. He is also a senior negotiator on federal, interstate, and international issues related to the Colorado River. Ted has testified before U.S. Congress and before the Colorado General Assembly. He has also appeared on Rocky Mountain PBS-Colorado State of Mind and a number of NPR programs, presented at dozens of water conferences and seminars, and written articles for the Denver Water Law Review, the Water Report, and the Colorado Water Law Benchbook.

Previously, Ted was employed by the Colorado Office of the Attorney General, as an Assistant Attorney General in the Water Unit.

Jim oversees all programs in the DNR, including the Permits and Registrations Division, the Floodplain and Dam Safety Division, the Planning Assistance Division, the Integrated Water Management Division, the Management Services Division, and water administration and other activities carried out by the Field Offices. Jim is also actively involved in many interstate organizations on behalf of the DNR, including the Governance Committee for the Platte River Recovery and Implementation Program (Chair, 2011), the Republican River Compact Administration, the North Platte Decree Committee, and the Missouri River Association of States and Tribes.

Mr. Schulte serves as the Manager of Source Water Protection and Emergency Response for the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission, ORSANCO, where directs the Commission's Source Water Protection programs, Emergency Preparedness and Response programs and the Commission's Organics Detection System, acknowledged both nationally and internationally as one of the premier riverine spill detection systems. He also serves as the Commission's staff liaison to the Ohio River Basin Congressional Caucus. During his 27 year tenure with the Commission, Mr. Schulte has overseen virtually all of their chemical and biological monitoring programs.

Mr. Schulte is the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Interstate Council for Water Policy, is the former President of the Water Quality Section of the American Fisheries Society, represents the Commission at meetings both nationally and internationally, and has been instrumental in the development of, and ongoing efforts supporting the Ohio River Basin Congressional Caucus.
